## Indigenous Trauma Care: Decolonizing Mental Health

In this time where our personal health and well-being and that of our communities is being challenged, Tribal communities are looking to Traditional Indigenous Knowledge and Indigenous Trauma Care as an opportunity to achieve a connection to the intrinsically wellness-based elements of our cultures.

In this session we address the impact of the legacy of colonization on Tribal communities and its impact on health outcomes and addressing how culture acts as a mitigating factor in Tribal health. We will redefine what trauma is, by reframing it from a Traditional Indigenous perspective. Two projects will be outlined, the Yappalli Project and 49 Days of Ceremony, to highlight the ways these concepts can be implemented into practice and research.
